<p>Meeting people indoors</p>	<p><b>From 14<sup>th</sup> Sep '20</b>                      Maximum group of 6 people from multiple households (following social distancing guidelines) larger groups can meet if from the same household or support bubble see guidance for further details.</p> <p>Can I go to a pub or restaurant with people I don't live with?                      When eating or drinking out with people you do not live with (and who are not in your support bubble), you must keep to the wider rules on group sizes: you must only attend these places in groups of up to 6 people. You can attend in larger numbers with the people you live with/ who are in your support bubble.</p> <p><b>In all cases, people from different households should ensure they socially distance as much as possible.</b> You should think</p>	<p><b>From 14<sup>th</sup> Sep '20</b>                      Advice is that no more than 6 people in total (from a maximum of 2 households) should meet at any time.</p> <p><b>Children under 12 do not count towards the limit of 6 people who can meet.</b></p> <p><b>For hospitality:</b>                      You are advised to meet people from no more than 1 other household at a time (up to 6 people in total) in a pub, restaurant or café or other hospitality venue.</p> <p><b>Children under 12 do not count towards the limit of 6 people who can meet.</b></p> <p><b>Currently no changes to weddings and gyms etc.</b></p>	<p><b>From 14<sup>th</sup> Sep '20</b>                      A maximum of six people from the extended household will be able to meet indoors at any one time. 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	<p>about where to sit at a table with this in mind – the premises should also take reasonable steps to help you do so in line with COVID-19 Secure guidelines. It remains the case that you do not need to maintain social distancing with those in your support bubble.</p> <p>Venues following COVID-19 secure guidelines can host more than 6 people in total, but no one should visit in a group of greater than 6. When they visit one of these places, such as a pub, shop, leisure venue, restaurant or place of worship they should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- follow the limits on the number of other people they should meet with as a group (it will be illegal to be in group of more than six from outside of their household)</li> <li>- avoid social interaction with anyone outside the group they are with, even</li> </ul>			





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	<p>if they see other people they know.</p> <p><b>There are exceptions such as wedding ceremonies and receptions, organised indoor and outdoor sports, physical activity and exercise classes, outdoor sport and exercise allowed under the gyms and leisure centre guidance. (See link for full guidance). Wakes are not included in exemptions nor other gathering for religious ceremonies, other than the actual ceremony.</b></p>
